In a place I used to live I would often hear about a former church member named Cynthia. She was well loved in both the church and the town, and she loved others in return. The strength of Almighty God is ours in the battles we fight against sin and darkness. And God also sometimes just sends us joys and delights to provide the abundant life God wants for us.

As people of faith, our gratitude for God's grace means we willingly commit to be on God's side, too. We are sent to brighten bleak landscapes, to plant hope with our words and deeds wherever we find suffering and injustice. Our help is an act of service to the God who works on our behalf to bring about healing and redemption. Even creation is restored in the atoning work of Christ in this world and our care for the earth is part of our grateful response.

God is for us! May we have a joyous Easter, celebrating all this means for us and for the world!

Blessed be the Lord, who has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead (I Pet 1:3).

Reminiscing with Josephine Crasky

John 12:1-8



When coffee hour resumed on April 3, we were excited to be able to finally celebrate Josephine Crasky's 98th birthday, which was earlier this year on January 7. Susan Vorpahl provided a delicious cake.

The sermon text that day was John 12:1-8, the story of Mary, Lazarus' sister, who anoints Jesus' feet at a dinner with expensive perfume. It is a sign of her great love for him that she would be so extravagant in her giving. Interestingly, this passage took on new life to me when over the next few days I kept hearing of different people giving generously to the church and to family with no other reason than love.

One of these moments occurred when I was speaking with Josephine. She told me about something her father did when she was a young teen. On September 21, 1938 Josephine's father noticed the beginnings of what would be an infamous hurricane of '38. He quickly left work in Montauk and drove through high winds and water to get to the Amagansett school where his four children attended. Josephine was about 14 at the time and remembers that day well. "We went

across Montauk Highway with branches swaying and everything. Can you imagine, taking your kids outside in all that?" Fortunately, the family lived just across from the school. But no effort was too great for her parents to make sure their children were safe while they waited out the storm.

Fast forward to when Jo was a parent, and her daughter Sheila began college. Jo wanted her to have spending money, but the budget had all gone to bigger college bills like tuition. So Jo took a job as an Avon Lady, setting aside her earnings to give to Sheila while she was a student. "I loved being an Avon Lady," says Jo. "And turns out I did well at it."

Going door to door, Jo sold make-up, perfume, jewelry, and more. She received many prizes for her excellent sales record. Jo keeps her prizes in a glass case in her house - pretty dolls in fashionable outfits. The collection is a wonderful reminder to Jo of a time when God provided for her daughter's needs, and gave Jo much joy at the same time.



Thank you, Jo, for sharing these stories. Parental love is such a good example of sacrificial love, the kind of love we offer others when we understand like Mary in John 12 all that Jesus has done for us. Peace and joy await us in our giving.
